She spoke about the problem with dog fighting in CA, and problems with horse rescues Have. She discussed sick and dead animals of every kind living without proper feed or medical care. Lots of pictures and horrible stories of poor defenseless animals.

Dr. Nicole also spoke about the problem with animal shelters; the overcrowding, employee shortage, sick dogs, temperature problems within buildings, and the euthanasia performed. These dogs come in with parvo, distemper, injuries, no grooming, and sometimes older dogs are just abandoned by owners. She was asking for volunteers to come in and walk the dogs, groom the dogs, or even foster a dog if possible. They are also in need of towels, sheets, treats, and toys. She would love to get into schools and educate our youth to the importance of spaying and neutering our pets.

Molly Mackin will be getting a group together to volunteer walking the sheltered dogs on a weekly schedule. This should be happening before the end of October. She will also be collecting towels, sheets, toys, and treats.

5 Dog Facts That Put Most Of Us To Shame

Super Smellers

Dogs' sense of smell is often used for odor identification with some studies reporting that their olfactory capabilities are "as much as 10,000 – 100,000 times" that of the average human.¹

Talk about a sensitive nose!





Fantastic Jumpers

The highest jumping dog recorded by the Guinness world records is Feather, a female Greyhound from Maryland. Her record-setting jump was measured at a whopping 75.5 inches or about 3 times her own body

Great Swimmers

The PDSA, a charity organization dedicated to helping pets in need, awarded Whizz their Order of Merit in 2016 for saving nine people and a dog from drowning during a ten-year water rescue career.

Newfoundland dogs (like Whizz) are fantastic swimmers due to their muscular build, thick double coat, and webbed paws.³



Much Faster

Greyhounds make a second appearance here as they are considered some of the fastest, if not *the* fastest, dogs in the world. Built for agility, their top speed can exceed 40 mph.⁴

For comparison, Usain Bolt's world record 100m dash clocked in at about 28mph.

Super Hearing

Did you know a dog's hearing is about 4x more sensitive than ours?

Their inner ear canals are longer than ours, allowing them to hear more accurately from farther away. With their 18 ear muscles (humans only have 6), dogs can adjust their ears to funnel sound more efficiently and triangulate where noises come from.



Quite impressive, right? Still, keen senses and athletic ability are expected from most predators. What truly amazes us are dogs' intelligence and social skills. Studies report that the average dog knows and can understand over 100 words Additionally, scientists observed that dogs are quite adept at reading people - often better than chimpanzees.

If you're interested in achieving better communication and understanding with your learner, we have everything you'll need to get started in teaching them to talk!

Dog Park Awareness

We are proud of our Dog Park and encourage our members to use it. However, dog parks are controversial and people have to be aware of the "dangers." Here are a few suggestions to keep your dog safe and happy at the dog park.

Dog Park Etiquette 101



STAY HEALTHY

Before heading to the park, make sure that your dog is in good health. Are they up to date on vaccinations and medications? If not, it's better to skip the park for now. If your dog is still a puppy, check with your vet to see if they're old enough for the dog park.

I have observed a group of people who come to the Dog Park on a regular basis and at a regular time each day. Over a few years they have formed some good friendships and a lot of camaraderie. But best of all they know each others' dogs and take responsibility for their own dog's behavior. I have seen when a dog gets too aggressive and the owner does not stop the behavior, they all simply move to the other side of the dog park letting them know, even if in a passive way, that their dog's behavior is not tolerated. When my small dog comes with me, my friend who is part of that group, lets me know what dogs are safe and which ones will be too much for her. In this way I can determine if I want to take her in that day or not.



Inherent hazards and risks include but are not limited to:

1. Risk of injury from the activity and equipment utilized in canine activities of all kinds is significant including the potential for permanent disability and death.

2. Possible equipment failure and/ or the malfunction of my own or other's equipment.

3. My own negligence and/or the negligence of all others, including employees, agents, independent contractors or representatives of the BVSA, BVSCSD, and BVS TAILWAGGERS DOG CLUB, including but not limited to operator error.

4. The propensity of a canine (dog) to behave in dangerous ways that may result in injury or death to the participant or others or their dog(s) regardless of the dog's previous training and past performance.

5. The inability to predict a dog's reaction to sound, movements, unfamiliar environment, objects, persons, or animals.

6. Propensity for a dog to bite, fight, run, scratch, make unpredictable movements, jump, push or shove without warning or apparent cause.

7. Collars, harnesses, leashes and other equipment may loosen or break, which may result in accident, injury or death.

8. The domesticated animal may also react in a dangerous manner when condition or treatment is considered hazardous to the welfare of the animal.

9. The potential for a participant or others to fail to exercise reasonable care, or take adequate control when engaging in a domesticated animal activity, including failing to maintain reasonable control of the animal or failing to act in a manner consistent with the person's abilities.

10. Broken bones or severe injuries which may result in severe impairment or even death.

11. Pursuant to Section 305 of the BVS TAILWAGGERS DOG CLUB By-laws, I agree to take physical and financial responsibility for any dog under my custody or control; that if I am participating in any BVS TAILWAGGERS DOG CLUB event with a dog that is not my own, I shall be liable for damage or injury inflicted by any such dog; and that the Board of Directors or designated Event Coordinator or Trainer of BVS Tailwaggers Dog Club has the right to exclude any aggressive, unruly, or unmanageable dog and their handler from any BVS TAILWAGGERS DOG CLUB event.

I understand the description of these risks is not complete and that unknown or unanticipated risks may result in injury, illness, or death. I agree that immediately prior to participation in any activity arranged for me by BVS TAILWAGGERS DOG CLUB I will inspect the facilities and equipment to be used and if any defect is apparent I will not use the facility or equipment and I will notify the management of the BVS TAILWAGGERS DOG CLUB of the defect.

I HAVE READ AND FULLY UNDERSTAND THE ABOVE WAIVER, RELEASE AND ASSUMPTION OF RISK AND FULLY UNDERSTAND THAT I HAVE GIVEN UP SUBSTANTIAL RIGHTS BY SIGNING THIS WAIVER, RELEASE AND ASSUMPTION OF RISK AND SIGN IT VOLUNTARILY.
